What is Kids Voting Minneapolis?

A nonpartisan, nonprofit community-based organization, *Kids Voting Minneapolis* prepares students for a lifetime of voting. *Kids Voting* provides a K-12th grade curriculum that is taught in the classroom and exposes students to the concepts of citizenship, civic responsibility, democracy and the importance of political participation. Students cast a *Kids Voting* ballot on Election Day at Minneapolis polling places, voting on many of the same candidates and issues that adults do. By combining innovative classroom activities with an authentic voting experience, students gain the knowledge, skills and the confidence to become active citizens.

How It Started

Kids Voting was born upon the return of three prominent Arizona businessmen from a 1988 fishing trip to Costa Rica, a country that typically enjoys 90% voter turnout. The men were inspired by the strong local custom of children accompanying their parents to the polls. And they were motivated to act because of the growing trend of low voter turnout in the United States. They developed a school-based pilot project that has since grown into the national Kids Voting USA organization. It now serves more than four million students in 29 states and Washington D.C. Kids Voting Minneapolis is an affiliate of the state and national organization.

Kids Voting Minneapolis Helps K-12th Grade Students:

- Learn about their voting rights and responsibilities and the importance of civic participation
- Experience the voting process by going to their neighborhood polling place with their parents/guardian on Election Day and casting their vote
- Become part of an active, engaged, and well-informed electorate
- Begin a lifetime of citizenship and regular voting

2006 Goals

- Maximize student participation in the 2006 Kids Voting election
- Increase voter registration of 18 year-olds
- Increase adult voter turnout throughout Minneapolis, especially in communities traditionally underrepresented in the electoral process

Kids Voting Minneapolis Results

- More than 7,600 students, representing over 100 public, charter, and parochial schools, cast ballots at 97 neighborhood polling places in the 2004 Presidential Election
- More than 2,900 youth from 111 schools cast ballots in the 2005 City Election
- Over 400 volunteers helped students cast ballots
- 50,000 K-12 students are eligible to participate in *Kids Voting Minneapolis*
