The Voter's Guide is compiled by the League of Women Voters (LVW) of Minneapolis and the Minneapolis NRP to provide information to City residents about those candidates seeking a Neighborhood Representative seat on the 2007 NRP Policy Board. Candidates are running in one of four categories: At-Large, Protection, Revitalization, or Redirection. Electors selected by each neighborhood organization to vote on behalf of each neighborhood will vote for one representative and one alternate to sit on the NRP Policy Board from their neighborhood category and for an at-large representative and alternate.

The NRP Policy Board Neighborhood Representative candidate forums / election will begin at 6:30 p.m., on Tuesday, December 12, 2006 on the second floor of the Crown Roller Mill Building, 105 Fifth Avenue South. One candidate forum will be held in each of the four categories. Candidates will introduce themselves and respond to questions submitted by the League of Women Voters of Minneapolis and audience members. Candidate forums are moderated by LWV members and are free and open to the public.

The Crown Roller Mill Building is accessible to persons with disabilities. Parking is available on the street, in surface parking lots and in the Gateway and Depot ramps. <u>However, NRP will NOT reimburse parking fees.</u> To request language interpretation or childcare services during the election events, please call 612-673-5150 by December 1, 2006. How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I have been actively involved with Longfellow Community council - as a volunteer, as a member of the board of directors, and as a board officer. This experience has given me the opportunity to learn in a active way the role of neighborhood organizations and the importance of citizen participation in decisions that affect their lives. My work as an attorney has helped me to develop skills in problem solving and advocacy. As a neighborhood representative on the Policy Board, I would be able to use my experience on behalf of neighborhoods.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

NRP's strength is that it provides neighborhoods with the tools and resources to identify neighborhood problems and priorities and to find solutions unique to the neighborhood. NRP has also strengthened the neighborhood organization's ability to be both a forum for identifying community needs and desires and an advocate for implementing neighborhood goals.

NRP's weakness is that it does not have a secure source of funding into the future. Without a reliable funding source after 2009, neighborhoods will have fewer resources to implement neighborhood priorities after completing implementation of their Phase II Plans.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

I have been actively involved with the Longfellow Community Council (LCC) both in the implementation of its NRP Phase I Plan and with preparation of its Phase II Plan.

LCC Board member: 1999-2002(Board secretary) and 2005-present(Board president from April 2005-April 2006).

Co-Chair, LCC's NRP Phase II Steering Committee: 2005-2006. The Steering Committee coordinated the community outreach, drafting, and preparation of the NRP Phase II Plan, which was approved by the community in September 2006.

Co-Chair, LCC's Purina Task Force (2005-present) - for redevelopment of the former Purina Site; helping draft a Community Benefits Agreement.

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

I plan to send regular email updates to neighborhood associations on NRP issues and the actions of the NRP Policy Board. I would also be available to come to neighborhood board meetings to discuss NRP issues and obtain neighborhood input on NRP issues. I would also encourage feedback from neighborhoods through email or phone contact.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

One of the most critical issues for NRP is to secure funding after 2009. The Future Funding Task Force Report, presented to the Policy Board in April 2006, contains a number of options for future funding of NRP. The Policy Board's decision on future funding will likely be made next year. My priority will be to actively engage neighborhoods in discussion on the future of NRP and NRP funding. It is critical that the voice of neighborhoods be heard as this important discussion is happening.

Why are you running for a neighborhood representative seat on the Policy Board?

I am running for a seat on the Policy Board because I believe that neighborhoods need to be more involved in deciding NRP's future. Neighborhood organizations fulfill a vital grass-roots role in citizen engagement. NRP has positively changed the neighborhoods 's roles from commenting on proposed decisions that affect neighborhoods to identifying and implementing neighborhood priorities. Neighborhoods need to be actively involved at the table when decisions about NRP's future are being made. My involvement as a neighborhood volunteer and board member and my work as an advocate and problem solver will make me a strong voice for neighborhoods.

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I have a long history of community involvement dating from my youth. I have committed my professional and volunteer life to working in the public sector, with my focus on building stronger communities. I chose to move to Minneapolis after college because I wanted to live in a place with strong, distinct neighborhoods, where people come together to build their community from the ground up.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

I think the NRP's greatest strength is that it involves more Minneapolis citizens in their community than any other program in the City.

I think the main weakness of NRP is that we don't do a good enough job of building bridges between neighborhoods, to share our strengths and skills with each other.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

I have been involved in the Kingfield Neighborhood Association for the last four years. My involvement has included serving on the board, chairing the Redevelopment Committee and chairing the King Bridge Partnership. The King Bridge Partnership is an innovative partnership Kingfield has with the Bryant Neighborhood to build community connections around the construction of a new pedestrian bridge over I-35W at 40th street.

I am also the Executive Director of the Lyndale Neighborhood Association. In this role I am responsible for working with the board and neighborhood to implement all aspects of Lyndale's NRP plan.

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

I am already constantly striving to find opportunities to build partnerships with other neighborhoods around the city. If elected, I will continue my work to connect with other neighborhoods to gather their input on decisions facing the policy board.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

I would like to work on finding a solution to the long-term sustainability of NRP and neighborhood organizations in Minneapolis.

Why are you running for a neighborhood representative seat on the Policy Board?

I believe we are at a critical juncture in the history of Minneapolis. Over the next few years we will face the choice of continuing to keep Minneapolis' neighborhoods strong or letting them slide back to pre-NRP capacity levels. How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

My entire adult life has been characterized by community involvement and advocacy. During college, I led the St. Olaf College Democrats for four years. Among our accomplishments were orchestrating two record-breaking voter-registration drives and leading a community group opposed to big-box development. I continued my involvement when I moved into Nokomis East by volunteering for the Business Development Committee and winning election to the Board of Director. What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I've been a resident of the Steven's Square neighborhood for more than 3 years. I've served on the Steven's Square Community Organization (SSCO) board of directors since August of 2005. As the current Treasurer and a board member, I see firsthand exactly how important the NRP is to Neighborhoods. I also successfully completed the Community Leadership Institute from the University of St. Thomas.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

A major strength of NRP is that it empowers neighborhoods, through funding and guidance, to make future plans a reality. However, the NRP could go even further. I would like to see this program expand statewide.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

I was appointed to the SSCO Board of Directors from August 2005 to July 2006. While serving on the Board I took part in approving and adopting SSCO's Phase II NRP Plan. In August of 2006, I was elected Treasurer of the SSCO Board of Directors. I chair the Finance committee and head the Fundraising Committee. Additionally, I run the sound equipment for outreach events, the Red Hot Art Festival, and Movies in the Park.

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

Maintaining relationships and constant communication are vital for this position. I will immediately start an Internet discussion group with the executive directors and any residents of the 16 Neighborhoods I hope to represent. I'll also make myself available by email, cell phone, and in person at Board meetings to bring updates from the Policy Board.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

I would like to work to keep communities informed and ensure every neighborhood has the resources it needs to implement their NRP plans.

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I have lived in Phillips Neighborhood for 30 years, raised my two sons here (one teaches at North High and the other teaches in St. Paul) and have always been immersed in my very multicultural neighborhood and its needs and issues. My latest successful effort was to help build a coalition of my Hispanic, Somali, Native American, African American and white neighbors to lobby the state legislature for \$3.5 million to build a much needed Community Center for East Phillips Park. Since I have been president of East Phillips Improvement Coalition (EPIC) the board has finally begun to reflect the demographics of the neighborhood and to serve those groups, fund raising for the Hispanic Baseball league, creating affordable home ownership for the full spectrum of people here. I have chaired the East Phillips Commons Redevelopment, which produced a beautiful apartment building and served on the Village In Phillips Board, which built 28 lovely, affordable townhomes whose residents reflect almost every group in Phillips. A recent effort is beginning the creation of a multilingual Home Block Nurse program here, something only wealthier neighborhoods have, but which is more needed here. My experience in Phillips and my passion has been that no group and no issue should remain un-served by the neighborhood organization; however, I thoroughly understand how hard that is to achieve in an undercapitalized neighborhood.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

Strengths: The great strength of NRP is its admin. and implementation funding for the most local level of governance, the neighborhoods, and the freedom allowed them in decision-making in the use of their own funds. This is what has contributed most to citizen participation and the revitalization of all sectors of the city. I am convinced that trying to organize participation without the possibility of actually implementing something important is a "fool's errand", but giving ordinary people meaningful control over assets with which they can better their lives and beautify their surroundings brings volunteers out of the woodwork. NRP has resoundingly confirmed this for me and many others.

Weaknesses: The uncertain future of funding has created a loss of esprit, burn out and a sense of a lack of city support. This has hurt efforts at building participation and created an overall sense that neighborhoods are paddling upstream against the currents at city hall. Changing this would help bring back the earlier passionate sense of partnership with the downtown city government.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

I served on the Phillips NRP Housing Board for two years, served on the NRP Implementation Board, helped rebuild a new organization when People of Phillips failed, was treasurer of EPIC for three years and am now president, have chaired major housing and redevelopment projects in the neighborhood, which were accomplished with NRP dollars, and have been an NRP Rep to the NRP Policy Board for four years. I helped create our Housing Rehab Lottery and First Time Homebuyers Grants, using NRP funds to leverage other dollars. Many people who have been here through these times credit these efforts with literally saving the livability of East Phillips and our business district on Lake Street. I am very proud that my efforts and those of our residents have, with the help of NRP, moved home ownership here from about 13% to nearly 35%, all of it affordable

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

I hope to continue to work on building relationships with folks all over the city and spend time listening to the concerns, hopes, accomplishments, and needs of neighborhood folks from all neighborhood types, but especially those of "impacted" neighborhoods. I have continuously visited many neighborhoods and many people throughout the city have conversed face-to-face with me about concerns, a main one being their continued need for future and consistent funding, especially those neighborhoods for whom NRP has been a life line of major importance. Face-to-face is my preferred mode and I hope to continue to do that. I also hope to improve connections and collaborations between the other Redirection and "impacted" neighborhoods, so we can better empower and assist one another. This will take going to more Jordan and North side meetings and conversations.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

- Of primary importance to all "impacted" neighborhoods and those near that status is to ensure the
 continued and adequate funding of NRP. This means retaining remaining Phase I funds and securing
 adequate Phase II funds, but also working to make NRP a permanent part of the city governance
 and budgetary structure.
- Equally important, work to safe guard and guarantee continued neighborhood control of the implementation of these funds. This means working toward the central city government's full embracing of a clear partnership between the most local and the most central organs of governance and working to make that meaningful.
- Work on greater connection and knowledge/strategy sharing between neighborhoods.
- Work to build a more unified neighborhood political voice to help these things to happen and strongly represent this voice at the NRP Policy Board

Why are you running for a neighborhood representative seat on the Policy Board?

I know I will always show up at every meeting and be a strong voice for the funding and decision-making authority of all the neighborhoods, but particularly the "impacted" neighborhoods. I believe I have been especially good at bringing forward the special concerns of these neighborhoods. I have become more effective in the time I have served on the board and, in these next years when the longevity of the NRP is up for grabs, I believe experience and boldness are needed. My commitment to "grass roots" decision-making and recognition of the value of local volunteerism has always been key and I have seen and been a part of what that can accomplish. I have consistently been there and been vigilant for these concerns and would like to continue.

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I am a life long resident of Minneapolis have grown up in the Central and Field neighborhoods, I now live and own a house in the Shingle Creek neighborhood. In 2000, I took a three-month solo-backpacking trip through Europe. I found myself looking at the lay out of the cities and when I returned I looked a Minneapolis through a new light. How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I have prior Policy Board service and experience from 2001-2002 and 2004-2006. If reelected, the Protection Neighborhoods will have an experienced representative on the Policy Board during this critical time when Minneapolis is reviewing community engagement and future funding for the NRP. Neighborhood representatives need to be tough negotiators, but also capable of constructing compromises with public officials and community interest representatives. I twice served as vice chair of the Policy Board during my terms of service.

I am grateful for 12 years of service on the Minneapolis Capital Long-range Improvement Committee (CLIC), working with 32 other city residents/taxpayers appointed from all wards. Working on CLIC to prepare the annual capital budget and 5-Year Capital Program recommendations under different administrations reinforced for me the importance of listening and learning what others need and value to achieve compromise. I have learned to articulate arguments for those programs and projects deemed critical. Over the years, my CLIC colleagues elected me to serve on the Minneapolis Water Works Citizen Advisory Committee and to chair the Transportation & Property Services Task Force. During the 2006 term I served as vice chair, assisting chair Anthony Hofstede with performing the administrative functions for CLIC.

I strive for a balanced approach among family, community, and work life. My professional work has given me the opportunity to deal with diverse customers and stakeholders, meeting new and interesting challenges every day. In my work, I strive for quality, continuous improvement, and high ethical standards. I enjoy working with people who take a "can do" approach instead of a "can't do" approach to life and work.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

The greatest strength of the NRP is its "People Power", that is the invaluable work of engaged residents doing neighborhood-based planning and visioning work to improve the quality of life in the City of Minneapolis. Every neighborhood action plan that comes to the Policy Board embodies creativity and innovation from the democratic process of plan development in the community. The accomplishments of the NRP neighborhoods to improve the quality of life in our city by its reinvestment in our people and our infrastructure have drawn observers from across the country and around the world seeking to emulate the success we have achieved right here.

Despite a decade and one-half, one of the key weaknesses of the NRP remains the failure of municipal organizations to embrace and integrate neighborhood-based planning and approved Action Plans into their budgeting processes and systems. The lack of a diversified funding stream for NRP and the greatly diminished funding stream for Phase II since the 2001 tax reform are weaknesses that the Future Funding Task Force, on which I served, hope to remedy through City Council/Mayor action and/or state legislation.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

I have been engaged with other community volunteers in neighborhood activism in the Shingle Creek neighborhood and the Camden Community since the early 1990's. I helped found the Shingle Creek Neighborhood Association (SCNA) in 1992. I was elected to the SCNA board in 1992 and have served continuously as a director. In 2006 I stepped down as SCNA board chair after serving about 10 years, but currently serve as the board vice chair. Shingle Creek has been extremely prudent in the expenditure of its Phase I and Phase II NRP funds, working to leverage the maximum from other sources, and caring a great deal about community engagement, environmental and financial stewardship. I have represented the neighborhood's interests at public meetings, at the City Council, the Park Board, the School Board, and a committee of the Minnesota Legislature.

In addition to the SCNA, I have participated in the following projects and organizations: Minneapolis Industrial Land Use and Policy Study Steering Committee; Camden Alliance of Neighborhoods; CommonBond Communities' Shingle Creek Commons senior housing Community Board; Humboldt Industrial Park Planning, Visioning and Greening process; Neighbors for Neighborhoods; Penn Lowry Lyndale Implementation Council; Humboldt Greenway Citizens Advisory Committee; Mississippi Corridor Neighborhoods Coalition; ad hoc task force to oppose closing Shingle Creek School.

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

I pledge to remain accessible to neighborhood representatives and other stakeholders to be an effective representative for the residents of Minneapolis working through their respective neighborhood organizations. I pledge to continue work on development of future funding for the program and to advocacy for NRP continuation beyond 2009.

Keeping neighborhood folks informed through the timely publication of Policy Board agendas and meeting minutes on the NRP web site continues to be key, along with the free subscriptions for email notification process. While neighborhood representatives are not provided with any privileges or budget for communications the "NRP Link" remains a viable method for dissemination of program and Policy Board information to all neighborhood residents.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

The critical business item for 2007 is to continue the work to ensure that the NRP continues beyond 2009. The participating jurisdictions need to agree to provide adequate funding and support for the 2007-2009 period. City officials must engage the NRP as the city evaluates and considers reforms for its citizen participation processes during the remainder of 2006 and into 2007.

I am optimistic that wise policy makers in the participating jurisdictions ultimately will move to maintain the NRP beyond 2009. However, if progress is not made in 2007 to secure future funding for the program's Phase II, then I consider it prudent of neighborhoods to develop contingency plans to ensure the financial viability of their nonprofit organizations in a "post NRP" era. Director Robert Miller sounded the alert when he wrote in the NRP 5-Year Plan about the NRP potentially closing its doors.

Why are you running for a neighborhood representative seat on the Policy Board?

If elected as the 2007 Protection representative to serve on the Policy Board, I pledge to again devote my personal energy and time to serve the interests of the neighborhoods, to attend the Policy Board meetings and briefings, and to attend to work between meetings. I have the experience to work with elected officials, community interests, other neighborhood representatives, and various stakeholders to craft solutions about future funding and governance of NRP.

Because of my background, I am sensitive to the needs of neighborhoods when it comes to NRP policy implementation. I pledge to continue oversight of the NRP administration and budget to ensure that needs of the neighborhoods are met by the program. For example, in this period the orderly progression of neighborhoods through Phase II Action Plan development and review in a timely, respectful manner is especially important. The Policy Board needs to engage with the Mayor and City council as Minneapolis community engagement and citizen participation is evaluated or redesigned.

I contemplated not seeking another term. Following conversations with my peers, I concluded that if the electors desire to make use of my talents, that I am willing to serve another term.

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

I have been actively involved in my neighborhood's First Step, Phase I and Phase II planning, implementation and review processes. I helped to implement almost all of LHiNC's NRP projects, including the 44th St./PATH Project. I have secured extensive matching funds for neighborhood NRP dollars. I have worked closely with the Park Board, the Library Board, the public schools and the City's CPED, Finance, and Public Works Departments and have experienced the challenges of each.

I have served on the MRT; on the Policy Board as the Protection Neighborhood Alternate, and most recently the At-Large Neighborhood Representative; and on the Board's Focus Minneapolis Working Group, Nominating Committee and Bylaws Task Force. How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

Last week I attended a public hearing regarding the Franklin Steele Park renovation at the Minneapolis Park & Recreation headquarters. At our neighborhood board meeting, I asked if we could invite our Park Commissioner to an eminent Building Land Use & Housing meeting. This is not just to discuss the park renovation plan, but also to advance the Neighborhood Commons Initiative introduced in Elliot Park Neighborhood, Inc. (2002) Master Plan. I hope our neighborhood organization will assist in fostering greater cooperation between Park Board planning and the City's 10-year transportation plan. The 12 years I have owned my 6-unit apartment building have taught me a lot about our need for an interactive, engaged group of community organizations.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

NRP allows individual neighborhoods to designate priorities specific to the portion of the city they're in. While many citywide goals have broad appeal, often the ways to achieve them depend on the insight of the people closest to the questions at hand.

The reduction in Phase II allocations of money and uncertainty about funding beyond 2009 has led the neighborhood organization I'm part of to focus a lot of time on sustaining itself. While E.P.N.I. has two

board members who are Somali immigrants, we could do a better job of engaging African-Americans, Hispanics and people who rent the place they call home.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

I'm currently serving my third two-year term on our board of directors. In my first year I was elected treasurer. Last year I was a member of the NRP Phase II plan task force. I served on another task force which directed CDBG funds to start: 1) *Outsider's & Others*, (a neighborhood art gallery on Park Avenue in the Enger Bldg.) 2) Somali-American Friendship Association 3) implementation of EPNI's master plan. I am actively participating in our Building Land Use & Housing committee and plan to attend the October 16 meeting to renew a newly formed "Citizens Organizing Resources and Events". I've attended workshops regarding our neighborhood master plan, a focus on the re-design of Triangle Park on 10^{th} Street at 35W, meetings and a fundraiser for the downtown dog parks and workshops on the 10 year Minneapolis Transportation Plan.

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

If elected, I will purchase a dedicated e-mail account. If invited, I am interested in attending board or committee meetings. I am available by telephone afternoons and early evenings.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

Establishing a home loan program for improvements and rehabilitation of existing housing available to all NRP neighborhoods. I'm concerned that my own neighborhood has idled our home loan program for the past couple of years while we consider the possible need to redirect the loan repayments to our general operating budget. I realize CPED, the Center for Energy & the Environment, MFA and other programs exist, but I still think a neighborhood perspective on funding for energy improvements to landscaping is important.

Why are you running for a neighborhood representative seat on the Policy Board?

Our executive director informed us that that filing deadline had been extended because no candidates had filed for the position of Revitalization Neighborhood Representative. While Elliot Park is a Redirection neighborhood, I decided to run for the At-Large position. This is an important time for NRP. As our neighborhood considers a capital campaign with consulting from the Minneapolis Foundation, I would hope to discover ways to sustain the NRP funding we still get. It is my hope that the energy individual citizens bring to our neighborhoods need not be overly obsessed with fundraising.

How have your life experiences prepared you to be a neighborhood representative?

Lifetime experience working as a volunteer leader, organizer or director in church, community, school or youth recreation programs has provided me a strong understanding of the needs and capability to work effectively with neighborhood organizations. Having served on the NRP Policy Board the past 10 years has enabled me to learn the many ramifications of the program and provide guidance and direction on an equitable basis for all neighborhoods.

What do you consider to be the strengths and weaknesses of the NRP?

The strength of the NRP program is derived from the tremendous volunteer citizen participation enabling neighborhoods to cooperatively determine their own Action Plans in attaining their community's long-term strategic visionary objectives. From an overall viewpoint, there are no significant weaknesses. Policy and procedural changes implemented during the past few years have streamlined the program and greatly reduced previous concerns of high citizen participation turnover and burn-out.

How have you participated in your neighborhood organization and its NRP process?

Served as Chairman of the East Calhoun NRP Steering Committee for three years directly responsible for development of the neighborhood's Phase I Action Plan. Served several terms on East Calhoun Organization's Board of Directors, which was responsible for implementation of the Phase I Action Plan. Also served many years as Chairman of East Calhoun's Zoning Committee.

How do you plan to maintain a relationship with the neighborhoods you would represent if elected?

Experience has shown it is very difficult to maintain direct communication and attend meetings of all 31 Protection neighborhoods I represented these past 10 years. Currently, all relevant information on issues, policies and directives are very well communicated to the neighborhoods by NRP staff under direction of the Policy Board through its Executive Director. This process has been most effective. Nonetheless, I would make myself available to attend any neighborhood meeting when requested to provide information, counsel, guidance and any assistance when needed.

Name one thing you would like to work on if elected?

The tax revenue changes enacted by the State Legislature in 2001 drastically reduced the total funding available to NRP. Although the Lane Ordinance adopted by the City Council provided a limited source of revenue for NRP, it is not sufficient to satisfy the minimum funding to assure the continuation of the NRP program. Because of my financial background as a C.P.A. and my extensive knowledge of NRP's intricate financial structure, I would make every effort possible to concentrate on securing sufficient funding sources to assure the continuance of the NRP program not only through 2009 but as a permanent program of the City of Minneapolis.

Why are you running for a neighborhood representative seat on the Policy Board?

My 10 years on the NRP Policy Board, including 2 terms as Vice-chairman of the Board, has taught me that the financial structure of NRP is not simple, but complex with many intertwining financial, legal and governmental jurisdictional requirements. With the current financial challenges threatening the viability of NRP, I believe my financial knowledge of NRP, and my experience in analyzing the various options that may be available to NRP would be beneficial to the Policy Board in making decisions to assure a permanent NRP program operated on an independent community driven program operated on a sound, fair and equitable basis for all neighborhoods.
