John McKnight to be Keynote Speaker at NRP Awards Dinner

When the NRP commemorates its 10-year Anniversary on February 24, it will do so with a keynote address from Northwestern University Professor and Institute for Policy Research (IPR) Co-Director John McKnight.


For nearly three decades, McKnight has conducted research on social service delivery systems, health policy, community organizations, neighborhood policy, and institutional racism. He currently directs research projects focused on asset-based neighborhood development and methods of community building by incorporating marginalized people.

McKnight has been associated with many of the Institute's major research projects since he joined the organization in 1969. These have included research on the urban determinants of health, law enforcement, urban disinvestment and metropolitan government, deinstitutionalized child welfare services, police anticrime programs, and the effects of the perception of crime upon community responses. He also directed the Chicago Innovations Forum, an IPR-based dialogue among neighborhood leaders and innovators in economic, political and social development.



Much of McKnight's work on asset-based community development is captured in a book he co-authored in 1993: Building Communities from the Inside Out: A Path Toward Finding and Mobilizing a Community's Assets. The book has circulated through a broad range of community, government, business, nonprofit, and educa-

McKnight serves on the Board of Directors of numerous community organizations including the Gamaliel Foundation and The National Training and Information Center. Before joining Northwestern, McKnight directed the Midwest office of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. Workshop Aimed at Helping Youth Added to Neighborhoods Conference Lineup

The Search Institute of Minneapolis recently agreed to conduct a special workshop at the February 24 NRP Neighborhoods Conference. The workshop, titled "Building Neighborhoods That Help Youth Thrive," will give Minneapolis residents an opportunity to learn how they can help young people succeed in today's ever changing world. The Search Institute will share research identifying 40 developmental assets necessary for youth to live prosperous lives. While many of these assets already exist within our neighborhoods, they often times go untapped. The Search Institute will lead a discussion aimed at assisting neighborhoods in providing young people with the resources they need to develop more of these assets.

The Search Institute's research shows that the more of these developmental assets young people have, the more likely they are to do well in school, maintain good health and get involved in pro-social activities – and the less likely they are to take drugs, drop out of school or engage in violence. This session is sure to engage participants in a discussion of neighborhood level strategies for building developmental assets in youth.

Tree Trust Grants Available for Tree Planting

Neighborhood groups, businesses, cities, churches and schools are eligible for grants of up to \$10,000 for tree planting next spring through a program established by Foster Wheeler Twin Cities and the University of Minnesota.

The program, UNITREE, is administered by Tree Trust to help promote energy conservation, improve air quality through urban reforestation and educate the public about the community forest.

Grants are available for areas surrounding the University of Minnesota Twin Cities campus including the Marcy Holmes, SE Como, Cedar-Riverside, Prospect Park-East River Road, Phillips, Seward, and Elliot Park neighborhoods in Minneapolis.

Three neighborhood groups participating in the NRP-the Marcy Holmes Neighborhood Association, the Seward Neighborhood Group, and Prospect Park East River Road Neighborhood Association- received Tree Trust grants in the last three years.

UNITREE is now in its 7th year of operation. In that time, Tree Trust has coordinated the planting of 2,300 trees.

To qualify for a grant, organizations must develop a planting project with at least 75% trees, organize local community volunteers to learn about and help with planting, and provide a long term maintenance plan. They are also required to provide \$10 per tree or six shrubs planted.

Tree Trust will provide up to an average of \$100/tree, provide support in developing and reviewing applications, order and deliver plants and trees and provide educational support and hands on demonstrations to the grantee.
