## Surprise party honors 10-year anniversary of Bob Miller as NRP Director

More than 120 well-wishers surprised Bob Miller with a party on June 27 to honor his 10-year anniversary as the NRP director.

During the party, which quickly became a roast, Bob was presented with meaningful gifts including a tie from Hennepin County Commissioner and past NRP Policy Board Chair Mark Stenglein, an Indiana Jones hat from Minneapolis Library Board Trustee and Policy Board Chair Diane Hofstede and a Superman cape from former Minneapolis School Board Member and past Policy Board Chair Ann Berget. NRP staff presented Bob with a pair of bronzed rubber boots in the style that he has made famous. Bob also received a serious gift on this milestone occasion, a plaque from NRP staff thanking him for 10 years of service to Minneapolis residents.

Bob became the NRP director on June 22, 1992. Prior to coming to the NRP, Bob was the director of the Community and Resource Exchange (CARE) and



had worked as the planning supervisor in the Office of Planning and Development for Hennepin County from 1979-1991. Bob was also a successful Minneapolis restaurateur.

#### Community and economic development report released: community meeting set for July 9

#### In-depth training for neighborhood organizers

Neighborhood organizations are increasingly facing challenges that require having skilled organizers on staff. In order to assure that these organizers are equipped with the skills they need to do their jobs effectively, a special training program is now being offered by the Minneapolis Training Program for Neighborhood Organizers (MTPNO). This training program is geared toward assisting organizers with the complex problems facing their specific neighborhood organizations. The program will combine comprehensive coverage of organizing basics, training tailored to the individual needs of each organizer and group, long-term follow through, and group support from fellow neighborhood organizers. The six week program will take place on Tuesday nights.

#### Pierre Bottineau Library groundbreaking July 13 at the historic Grain Belt Brewery

A festive event to celebrate the start of construction of the new Pierre Bottineau Community Library will take place at I:00 p.m. on Saturday, July I3 at the historic Grain Belt Brewery campus, Marshall and Broadway Sts. NE. What was once the brewery's mill wright shop and wagon shed will be restored and reconstructed; along with a new wing, they will be transformed into a spacious and attractive library, where neighborhood people can gather, browse and read in a friendly and thoughtfully designed space in the heart of the community. By summer 2003, the reinvented I2,000 sq. ft. Pierre Bottineau Library will have replaced the overcrowded storefront that has served the neighborhood since I957.

# Jeremiah Program expansion groundbreaking July 23

Join friends and board members of the Jeremiah Program at a groundbreaking ceremony for a facility expansion project that will increase the Child Development Center's capacity to 62 children and create 21 additional units of housing for families headed by single parents. The Jeremiah Program was awarded \$1 million from the NRP's Affordable Housing Reserve Fund to be invested in the \$4 million expansion. The current Jeremiah Program facility was built in the Loring Park neighborhood in 1997 to help low-income single parents and their children move from a position of economic dependency to economic and personal self-sufficiency.

Picnic in the Park is an annual summer celebration of the Hale, Page and Diamond Lake neighborhoods. This year the event will be held from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 25 at Pearl Park, 414 E. Diamond Lake Road. More than 2,000 people attend the event each year. Picnic in the Park is a wonderful way for residents, businesses, churches and nonprofit organizations to celebrate their neighborhoods and meet one another while enjoying entertainment, music, food, games, prizes and fun. This year there will be a special live music performance by the reggae/salsa group D'Crew from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Minneapolis Fire Department trucks, the Minneapolis Police Department canine unit and McGruff will all be on hand.

## National Night Out block party barricade deadline set

On August 6, Minneapolis will celebrate its 19th annual National Night Out (NNO). That night, many block clubs will close off their streets to make their block parties safer and more enjoyable. Last year, more than 500 streets were closed. People planning to close off their streets this year should request barricades as soon as possible. Block clubs need to get the signatures of 75 percent of the residents on the block in order to get approval to close off a street. Requests are filled on a first-come first-served basis. Because there are a limited number of barricades, the City Clerk's office has set deadlines for reserving them. There is no assurance that barricades will be available for all who want them. The City Clerk's deadlines for reserving barricades are:


- July 9: Free barricades for applications received or postmarked by July 9
- July 10-23: \$15 fee for applications postmarked between July 10-July 23
- July 23: Requests denied for applications post marked after July 23

To obtain an application for barricades, block club reps can call the City Clerk's office at 612-673-2114.
