Minneapolis Neighborhood Revitalization Program News

No decision made on long-term funding of NRP

One of the most common questions being asked by Minneapolis residents these days is how will the NRP be funded in the future. There is no simple answer to this question.

City leaders have been making difficult budget decisions that address a projected \$55 million budget deficit over the next five years in a way that also reflects the priorities of Minneapolis residents.

On January 31, the Minneapolis City Council approved a Five-Year Financial Direction for the city. This financial direction provides city departments with a clear picture of the level of financial resources that will be available over the next five years. The Five-Year Financial Direction includes \$33 million annually for

community development. This is the resource from which NRP funds would be drawn. Deciding how these resources will be allocated will be one of the decisions the City Council and mayor will have to address soon. The NRP was created in 1990 by city officials and community leaders as a response to growing concerns about the declining condition of Minneapolis neighborhoods. The program was originally established as a 20 year, \$20 million a year program. Legislative reform of the tax system in 2001 dramatically reduced the funding source that has historically supported the NRP.

All training series workshops will be presented by NRP staff and other seasoned neighborhood veterans, and will be held at the Crown Roller Mill building, 105 Fifth Ave. S., Suite 200, in MCDA Conference Room #3. All weeknight sessions will take place from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., and all Saturday sessions (Feb. 15) will take place from 9:00 a.m. to II:00 a.m.

Other topics scheduled to be covered during this series of weeknight and Saturday workshops include: How to Leverage Investment through the Community Reinvestment Act (February 25) and Preserving Your Neighborhood's History (March 6).

How to Leverage Investment through the Community
Reinvestment Act - Enacted into law in 1977, the Community
Reinvestment Act (CRA) was established to encourage banks
to help meet the credit needs of their communities. Each
bank is evaluated on its level of engagement in local community development initiatives, including housing and economic development for low- and moderate- income individuals and areas. Presenter Margaret Tyndall of the Federal Reserve
Bank of Minneapolis will provide information on how your organization may be able to use the CRA to form useful partnerships with banks in your neighborhood.

Preserving Your Neighborhood's History- Your neighborhood organization may be a rich store of history, but does it seem more like a cluttered nightmare? How do you sort through the acres of paper? Getting to the bottom of the ballot group to host After the Election 2003 workshop series

Getting to the bottom of the ballot is a voter education initiative launched in 2002 by a group called Southwest Citizens for Civic Engagement. The group's goal is to keep Minneapolis residents informed about local issues year round. In order to achieve its goal, the group is hosting a year-long series of local-issue seminars beginning at 7:00 p.m. on February 18, 2003 with a seminar titled *Follow the Money II*. The seminar focuses on restoring the city's financial health at a time when the city faces a budget deficit. The seminar will look at how the state deficit may create further challenges for

the city. Council Members Barret Lane and Scott Benson will lead a panel of southwest state legislators including Senators Scott Dibble and Jane Ranum and State Representatives Frank Horenstein and Paul Thissen—through a discussion about how the state deficit will affect Minneapolis.

All of the seminars in the series will be held at Southwest High School Community Education located at Chowen Ave. S. and W. 47th Street. Those who attend should enter door number 16 at the school.
