Home Tour Highlights Remodeling, **Neighbors Improving Community**

Minneapolis & Saint Paul Home Tour 2009 Guides are available at local libraries, and the website, www.MSPHomeTour.com, has descriptions of all 60 homes on the free, selfguided tour. This 22nd annual tour, coordinated by NRP and sponsored with other public and private entities, is a celebration of city living and home improvement inspiration. The event is Saturday, April 25, 10 a.m.-5 p.m. and Sunday, April 26, 1-5 p.m.

Twenty four Minneapolis neighborhoods are represented, and Audubon Park, Linden Hills, Lynnhurst and Stevens Square have at least three locations in the 2009 Tour. Minneapolis has 39 featured homes, and Saint Paul has 21. Mark your calendar to tour the homes or to help your neighborhood group have a presence at the home or homes in your area.

This year's homes have a wide variety of kitchen solutions, bath options, space additions and basement remodels (such as Longfellow activist Candyce Anderson's basement). Neighborhood organization input had an impact on some of the projects.

They include 4307 Wentworth Ave. where a small foreclosed one-bedroom, one-bath house was stripped to the foundation and transformed into a three-bedroom, two-bath, "green," energy-efficient home in the style of

surrounding homes, with a two-car garage. It's for sale at \$142,000 through the City of Lakes Community Land Trust to a qualified low-income buyer. The home's green reconstruction was a collaboration between Hennepin County Taxpayer Services and Environmental Services (which financed part of the work with a \$25,000 environmental grant) and the Kingfield Neighborhood development group.

A green, LEED certified home at 1415 18th Ave. NE, constructed with the guidance of the Windom Park Citizens in Action, is another of the dozen featured Eco-Tour homes within the larger tour.

The University District Alliance (a partnership featured in a recent LINK) will be promoting home ownership incentives and their www.livenearyourwork.net website. The five locations are: 201 SE 6th St., 518 7th St. SE, 1022 16th Ave. SE (for-sale, featuring architect ideas for its new kitchen), 901 20th Ave. SE (solar) and 204 Cecil St. SE (studio).

Follow-Up 4/19 on Selection Process for NCEC Reps from Neighborhoods

A meeting of Minneapolis neighborhood group designees is set for Sunday, April 19, to continue discussion on how to select neighborhood representatives to the City's new Neighborhood and Community Engagement Commission (NCEC). It will be held 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. at the Northeast Armory, 1025 Broadway St. NE, and it is open to the public.

Neighborhood designees from all neighborhoods of the city first met February 21 to discuss how to select their representatives to the Commission. They requested that a follow up meeting be held.

Given the other meetings and events already scheduled for Saturdays in April, and to avoid conflicts with neighborhood meetings already scheduled during the week nights, Sunday afternoon, April 19, was selected as

In an effort to help guide the April 19 discussion, NRP and city staff have drafted six models for electing the neighborhood representatives to the NCEC. The models are based on the facilitator's notes from the last meeting. Three of the models are based on six districts and two at-large positions and the other three models are based on all eight representatives being elected from districts with no at-large positions.

Charter Commission Changes

The Minneapolis Charter Commission has finalized its 11th draft reorganizing and rewriting the entire City Charter, culminating a five-year effort. In a letter to community organizations, it was stated, "Please note that [these] amendments drafted by the Charter Commission do NOT include the recent substantive proposals made by Council Members Ostrow, Samuels, and Remington regarding the Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board, the Board of Estimate and Taxation, and changes in city government."

To review the proposed changes, which the commission terms "non-substantive," but intended to "simplify, modernize and organize that which should be in a City Charter while relegating applicable items to the jurisdiction of City ordinances," go to the Charter Commission website www.ci.minneapolis.mn. us/charter commission and click on "Proposed Revised Charter" and/or "Executive Summary" in the upper left hand portion of the page. Encouraging Planners to Involve Residents

Thousands of city planners and others in the planning field will visit Minneapolis from April 25-29 for the national American Planning Association convention. NRP staff will show how planning efforts can make a real difference in neighborhoods and cities with two tours that focus on results achieved by Minneapolis residents through NRP.

NRP Director Bob Miller will lead a walking tour of Nicollet Avenue and "Eat Street" to discuss how multiple neighborhoods and business interests collaborated to reverse the effects of previous city decisions that had gradually desolated the commercial corridor.

Representatives from Citizens for a Loring Park Community, Stevens Square
Neighborhood Association, the Whittier
Alliance and local businesses will help describe, explain, and assess the impact of the changes

that the neighborhoods created.

NRP staff will also narrate a bus tour visiting Pratt School, Whittier Community Center and the Windom School/Community Center. Stops will be made at each site to hear from residents who were involved in these major multi-jurisdictional efforts. Each is an example of neighborhoods working to create a community resource, adding community-building functions tailored to the specific area's needs and desires.

"The challenge, with any tour for visitors,"
Miller said, "is to communicate enough about
the factors involved, that they realize each of
these processes is unique...we want to encourage others to actively involve residents in their
planning processes to create truly successful
projects."

Japanese Visitors Studied Neighborhood Indicators and Participation System

Ms. Tazuko Ouchi, Professor at Edogawa University in Japan, and Instructor Yoshiyuki Paul Terai visited Dayton, Ohio and Minneapolis in early March to look at how Americans use neighborhood indicators and systems for participation.

Prof. Ouchi commended the "progressive approach to GIS by the American university and the forward-thinking team of NRP for the neighborhood planning and participation." She was surprised at how many people are fascinated by GIS (geographic information systems) but don't take the step of actually using it.

Mr. Terai, commenting on his visit, contrasted Minneapolis with Dayton where Model Cities and Community Development Block Grant money are managed by a Priority Board System as the official citizen participation vehicle somewhat separate from city government. Dayton's citizen participation manager is the vice president of Neighborhoods USA.

"It was a real pleasure to be able to host Ms. Ouchi and Mr. Terai and to spend some time discussing NRP and the many creative efforts neighborhoods and others are making to improve the quality of life for residents," commented NRP Director Bob Miller. "This visit was also part of our continuing effort to assist and support the activities of Neighborhoods USA and we are very pleased that we were able to help."
